A Sensible, Effective Response to Climate Change

Please help us welcome Michael Mark as he presents and discusses. "A Sensible, Effective Response to Climate Change" on Monday, May 23 at 7 PM in Freeman Auditorium. This lively 20 minute presentation consisting of slides and brief video will explain the "carbon fee and dividend" proposal for reducing greenhouse gas emissions and making our economy stronger.

Mark has been a volunteer with Citizens' Climate Lobby/ Citizens' Climate Education for five years, which is a national organization that does advocacy primarily at the federal level. They now have over 300 chapters in the U.S. and additional chapters in foreign countries.

Before retirement, Mark worked for the National Oceanic and Atmospheric Administration for over 25 years as a hydrologist doing river and flood forecasting. He also worked for 10 years for the PA Department of Environmental Protection in the public drinking water program and holds a degree in meteorology from the City College of New York, and a water resources engineering degree from Clemson University.
